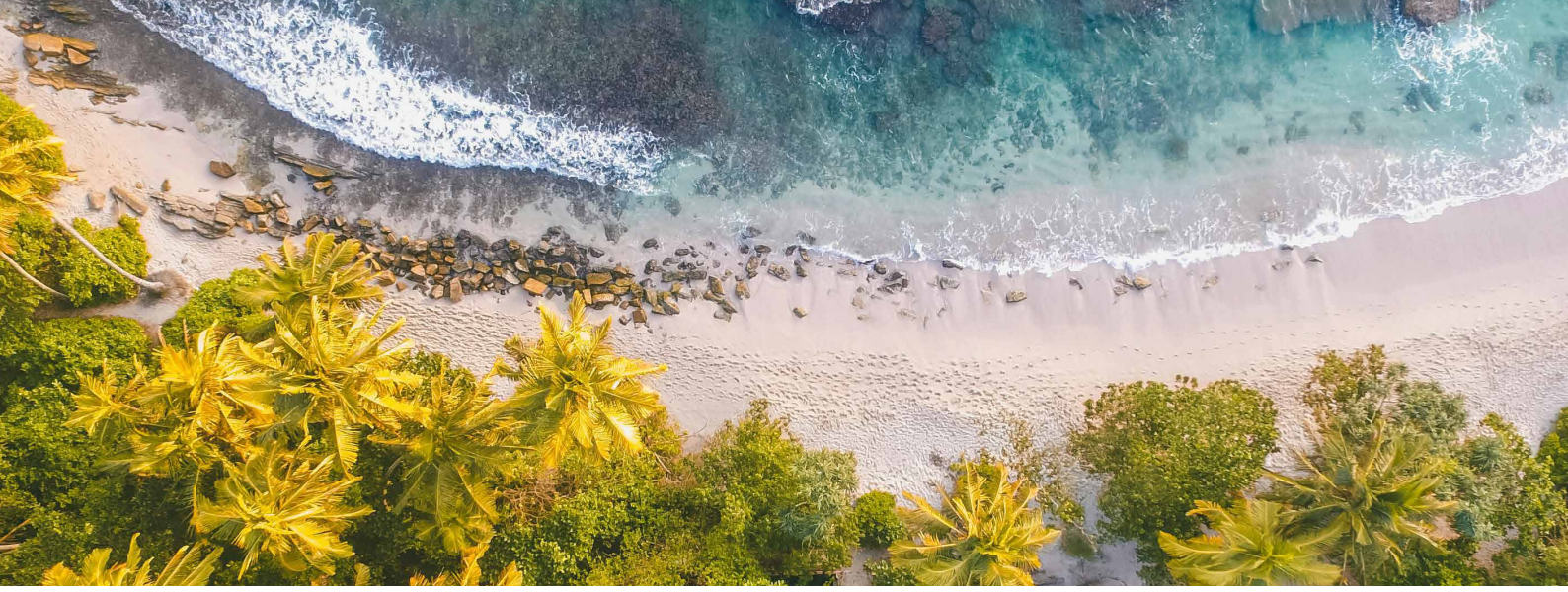

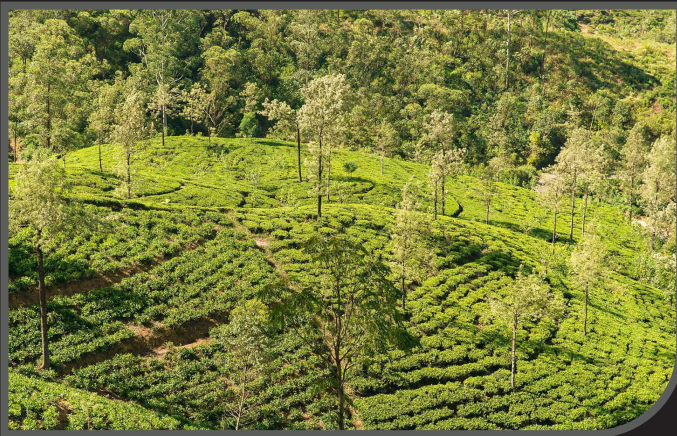

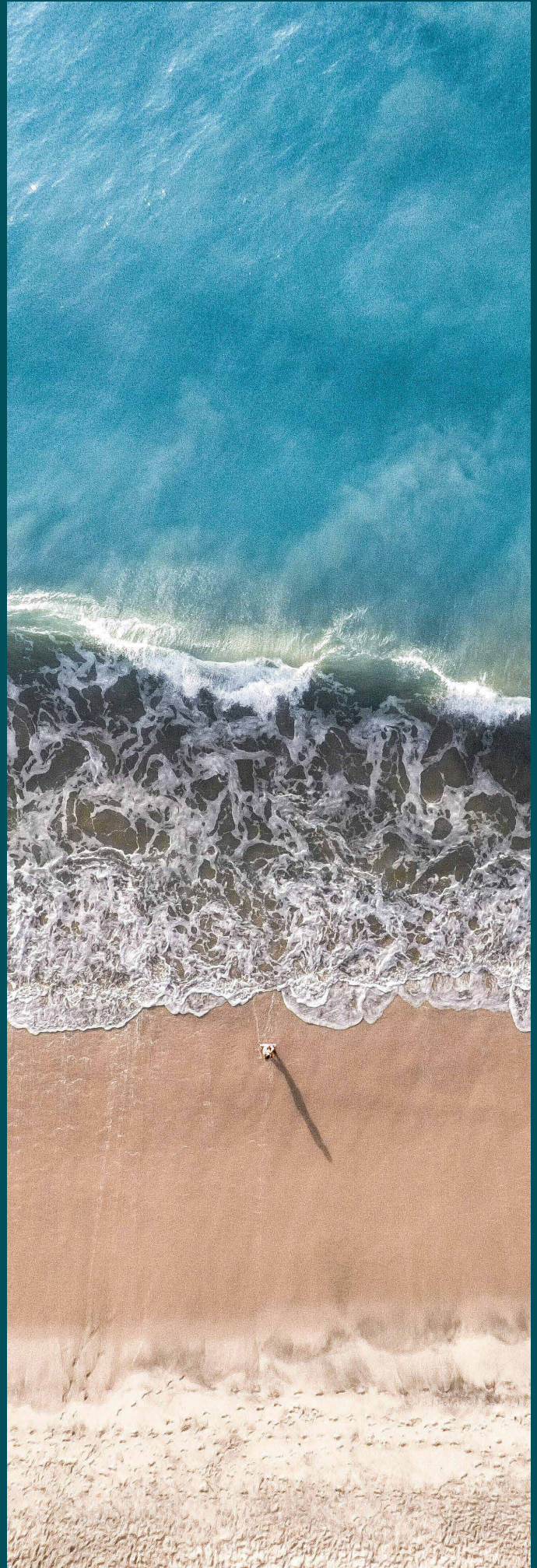
Sri Lanka's Coastline

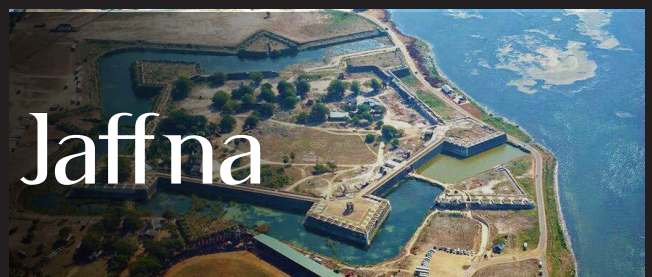
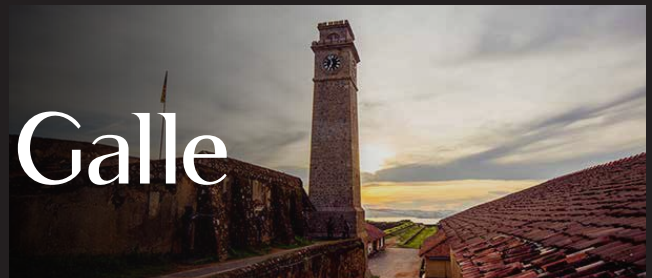

Wild Sri Lanka

Udawalawe National Park

A haven of open grasslands and scrub jungle, Udawalawe is best known for its thriving elephant population of over 600. These majestic animals are often spotted near waterholes or roaming the plains. The park is also home to Toque Macaques, Sri Lankan Leopards, and a variety of endemic birds. Reptiles, amphibians and freshwater fish enrich its biodiversity, making it an accessible and rewarding destination for wildlife enthusiasts.



Yala National Park

Officially Ruhunu National Park, Yala is Sri Lanka's most visited and second-largest national park. Its landscape blends dry forests, grasslands, wetlands, and thorny scrub. Block One is renowned for its high leopard density, drawing wildlife lovers from around the world. Visitors may also encounter sloth bears, crocodiles, buffaloes, monkeys and wild boars in the diverse and exciting terrain.

Minneriya National Park

Famous for “The Gathering” during the dry season, Minneriya offers the unforgettable sight of Asia’s largest congregation of wild elephants. As they gather around the ancient reservoir, visitors witness herds bathing, grazing, and socializing. While dense grasses may conceal other animals, the park’s open vista and seasonal spectacle offer a unique experience unlike any other.



Wilpattu National Park

Sri Lanka’s largest national park, Wilpattu spans over 1,300 square kilometers of pristine wilderness. Its landscape is defined by dense forests, sandy trails, and distinctive natural lakes known as “villus.” The park shelters sloth bears, deer, rich birdlife, and is one of the best places to spot the elusive Sri Lankan Leopard. Tranquil and less crowded, Wilpattu promises a more intimate and immersive safari experience.

Snorkeling

Slip beneath the surface and discover a vibrant underwater world. With just a mask and fins, you can explore coral gardens, rocky outcrops, and schools of tropical reef fish. Whether in shallow coves or marine sanctuaries, snorkeling in Sri Lanka offers peaceful, awe-inspiring encounters with marine life.



Kite Surfing in Kalpitiya

Located in the island's northwest, Kalpitiya is a laid-back coastal village known for its strong winds and calm lagoons. Ideal for both beginners and pros, it has become Sri Lanka's top kite surfing destination. Framed by sand dunes and palm-lined beaches, Kalpitiya promises thrilling rides across turquoise waters in an unspoiled natural setting.



Whale Watching

Sri Lanka is one of the world's best locations to witness blue whales in the wild. From December to March, Mirissa offers prime sightings, while Trincomalee takes the stage from March to July. Kalpitiya also hosts seasonal tours with frequent dolphin encounters and occasional sightings of sperm and Bryde's whales.

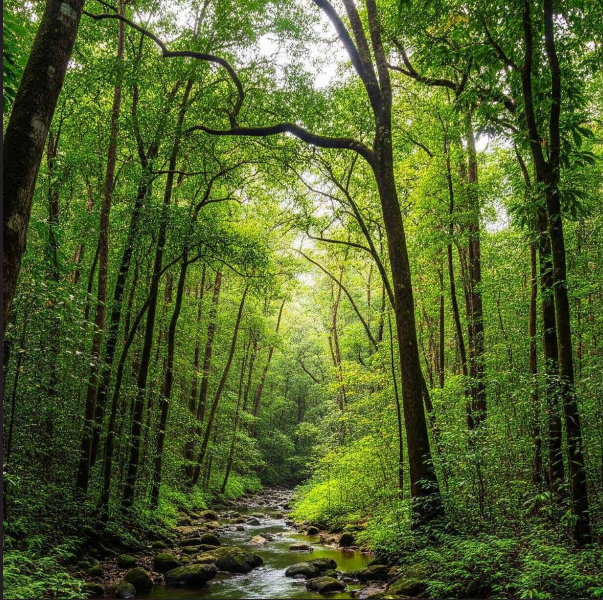


Yacht Sailing

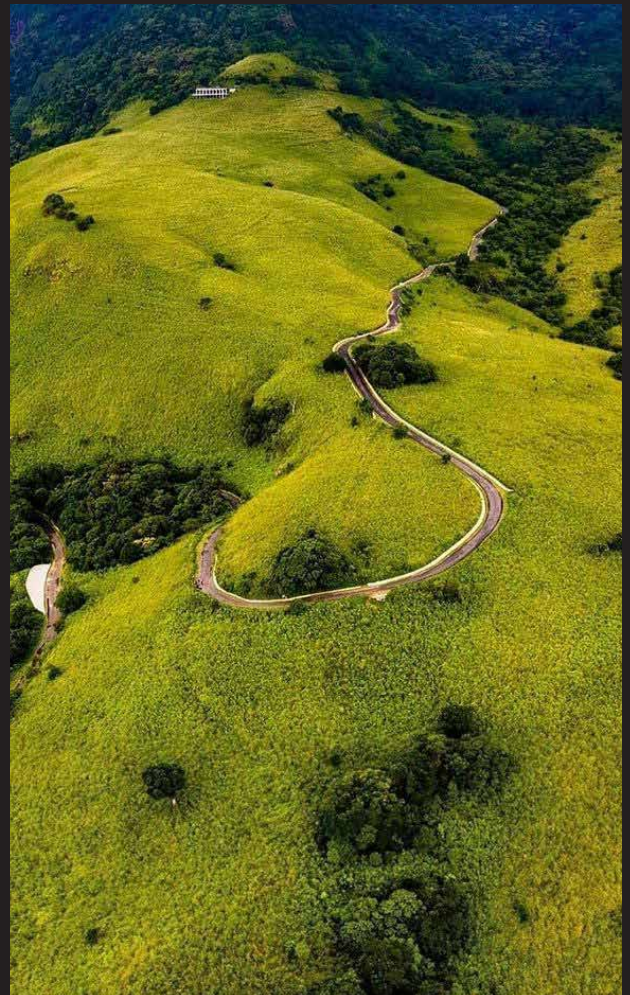


Sinharaja Forest Reserve

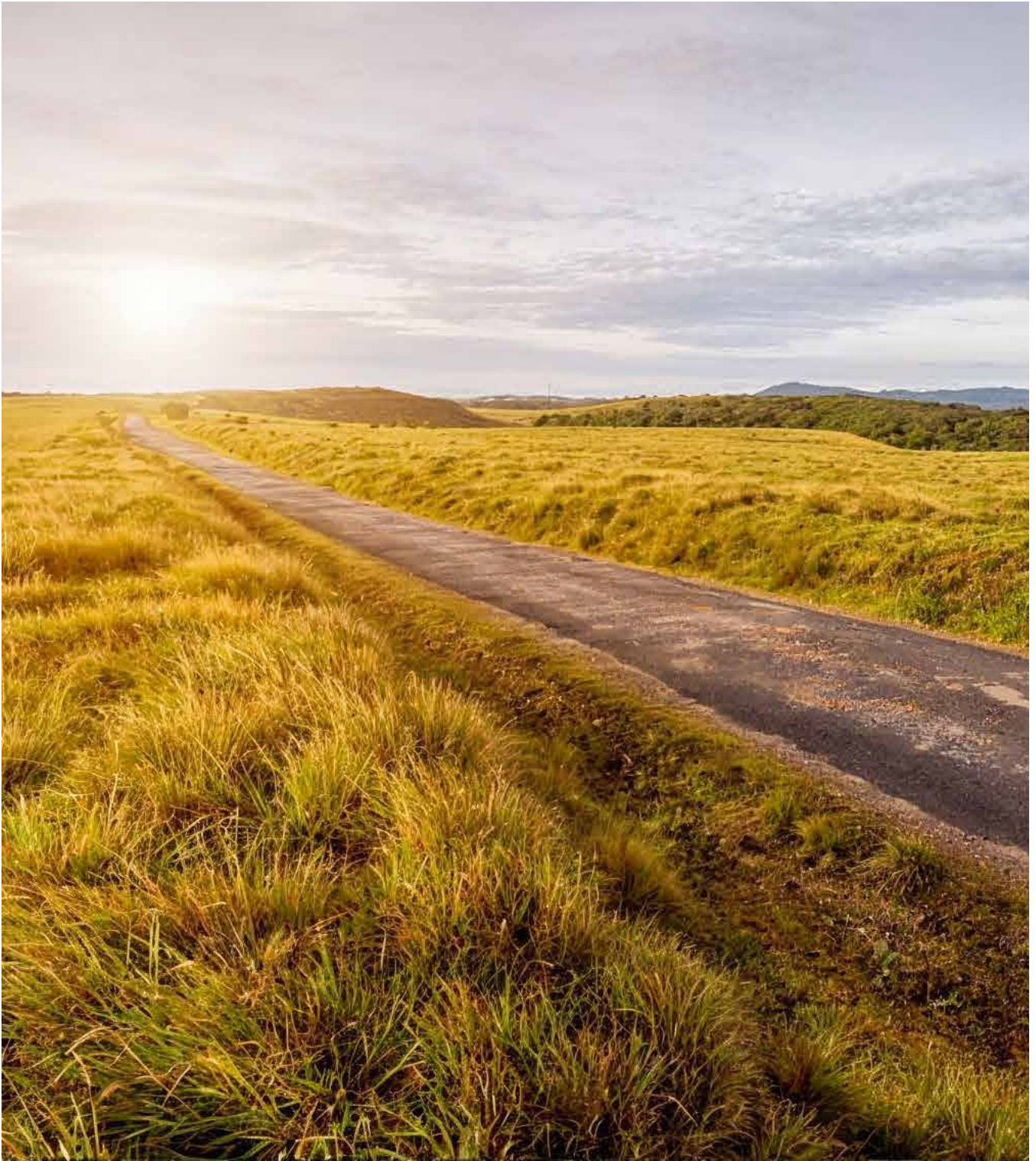
Widely regarded as Sri Lanka's crown jewel of biodiversity, the Sinharaja Forest Reserve is a UNESCO-listed tropical rainforest that offers an unparalleled eco-tourism experience. This dense and verdant sanctuary protects a rare blend of Tropical Lowland and Tropical Wet Evergreen Forests. It is also one of the most important habitats for endemic wildlife on the island. From the striking Sri Lankan Blue Magpie and Red-Faced Malkoha to the elusive Green-Billed Coucal, the forest is a birdwatcher's dream. Over half of Sri Lanka's native butterfly and mammal species can also be found here, adding to its ecological significance and allure.

Riverstone

Nestled within the Knuckles Mountain Range in Matale, Central Province, Riverstone is a hidden treasure for hiking enthusiasts. Rising to an elevation of 1,424 meters, this relatively untouched peak offers panoramic views and fresh mountain air without the crowds. The trail to Riverstone's summit spans approximately two kilometers and is ideal for casual hikers, requiring no specialized gear. The nearby Pitawala Pathana Mini World's End offers sweeping cliffside views, while the Riverston SLT Tower Mountain is a perfect vantage point to pause and soak in the scenery. With its blend of tranquility and natural beauty, Riverstone invites visitors to experience Sri Lanka's highlands in their purest form.

Horton Plains

Perched on the central highlands, Horton Plains stands as the coldest and windiest region in Sri Lanka. A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2010, this plateau is home to an extraordinary range of ecosystems, from montane evergreen forests to vast grasslands, misty marshes, and sparkling streams. The area is rich in endemic flora and fauna, making it a paradise for ecologists and nature enthusiasts. The famed World's End escarpment offers dramatic cliffside views stretching as far as the southern coast on a clear day, while nearby Baker's Falls adds a tranquil touch to this remarkable wilderness.

Sri Lanka's Wild Waters

Kitulgala White-Water Rafting

Kitulgala, set in Sri Lanka's lush wet zone, is famous both as the filming location for *The Bridge on the River Kwai* and as the island's top spot for thrilling white-water rafting on the Kelani River. Known as the wettest place in Sri Lanka, it boasts rich birdlife, scenic hiking trails, and warm local hospitality featuring traditional rice-curry lunches. Adventure and nature blend perfectly here for an unforgettable experience.



Madu River Boat Safari

Explore the enchanting Madu River wetland, a UNESCO-recognized Ramsar site with 64 islands and pristine mangrove forests. Cruise beneath mangrove tunnels, witness traditional cinnamon peeling, visit a Buddhist monastery, and enjoy a playful fish spa—where tiny fish nibble at your feet. As dusk falls, watch fishermen light lanterns on their traps, creating a magical riverside spectacle. The Madu River promises a rare and soulful journey into Sri Lanka's natural and cultural treasures.

Sigiriya

Rising dramatically from the central plains, Sigiriya is one of Sri Lanka's most extraordinary heritage sites. Built in the 5th century by King Kassapa who famously seized the throne through patricide, this ancient rock fortress holds centuries of secrets within its walls. Visitors ascend steep staircases carved into sheer cliffs to reach the summit, where panoramic views reward the effort. Sigiriya is also famed for its stunning frescoes, ancient rock paintings that add an artistic dimension to its historical and architectural grandeur.





Kandy

Nestled in lush mountain landscapes, Kandy is Sri Lanka's second-largest city and a bastion of the island's rich cultural legacy. As the last Sinhalese kingdom to resist European colonial powers, Kandy played a pivotal role in the nation's history until it fell to the British in 1815. Today, it remains a vibrant cultural hub, most renowned for the sacred Temple of the Tooth Relic (Dalada Maligawa). This revered shrine safeguards one of Buddhism's most treasured relics, a tooth of the Buddha drawing pilgrims and visitors from around the world.

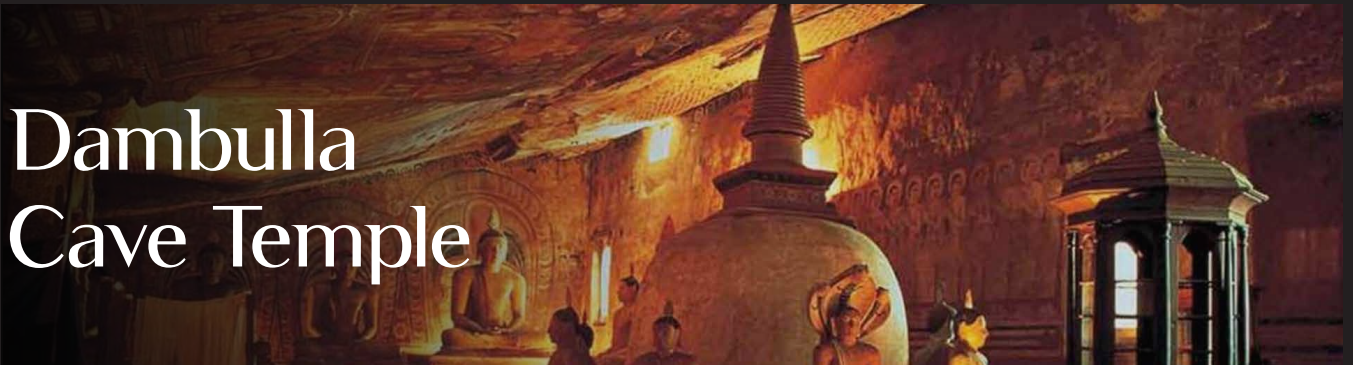

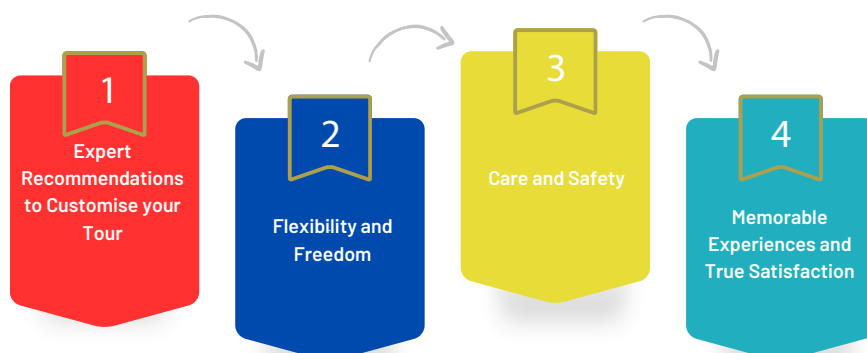
